

2022-2023 CURRICULUM OVERVIEW FOR PART-TIME ADMITS

This document outlines the plan of study requirements for FALL 2022 and SPRING 2023 admits who will begin their Foundation Field placement in FALL 2023. Advanced Standing students (those admitted with a BSW) and those in the Traditional 2-year MSW program must follow a different Curriculum Overview found here.

FOUNDATION CURRICULUM

The goal of the Foundation Curriculum, including the Foundation Field practicum, is to provide all students with a sound, broad base for future practice in any concentration. The following coursework provides educational and skill development in the values, concepts, and processes that are the core of social work practice.

Foundation Field Practicum

The Foundation Field practicum is an 8-month long internship, starting in the Fall semester. The practicums are generalist in nature and occur in all types of agencies serving a multitude of populations. They cover the spectrum of practice from working one-on-one with clients and facilitating groups, to an administrative or community assignment. Taken two days a week (either Mondays/Wednesdays or Tuesdays/Thursdays) for a total of 16 hours, students engage in carefully supervised and progressively more responsible social work practice.

ADVANCED CURRICULUM

The remaining 33 credits of the program, including the Advanced Field Practicum, are based on a student's selection of either the Clinical or Macro concentration. Both concentrations require an advanced policy course, (4) 3-credit advanced methods courses and two additional courses.

Students may select a secondary concentration, which would expose them to the other concentration's content through study in two courses. Their Advanced Field Practicum will still be based upon their primary concentration.



Advanced Field Practicum

The 8-month long Advanced Field practicum begins in the Fall and is for three days a week (typically Tuesdays, Wednesdays and Thursdays, unless specified otherwise by the Field agency). However, students may choose the 11- month Extended Field Practicum option that is over (September-July) for two-days a week. A methods course within the concentration must be taken concurrently with Advanced Field Practicum each semester.

Clinical Concentration

The Clinical Concentration provides a comprehensive gateway into the world of clinical social work. The goal is to provide an education and field practicum that prepares graduates to provide a range of therapeutic services to children, adolescents, adults, older adults and their families across multiple settings using a wealth of treatment modalities

Clinical coursework

The curriculum includes two required courses, Advanced Clinical Interventions (SWCL 700) and Psychopathology (SWCL 744). Advanced Clinical Interventions teaches students how to apply theoretical models in client assessment and treatment. Psychopathology is a comprehensive immersion into assessment, the use of Diagnostic and Statistical Manual Version 5, and evidence-supported practices. The clinical concentration also provides in-depth direct practice courses that focus on families, couples, and groups utilizing cutting-edge treatment approaches. In keeping with social work's history of providing services in multiple contexts and settings, the program offers courses on working in schools, hospitals, behavioral health settings, and child welfare agencies.

Clinical field work

In the advanced year, clinical field placements provide an intensive learning experience across a variety of settings throughout the region and abroad. Examples of these settings include:

- in-patient and out-patient behavioral health facilities and community-based clinics
- health care settings
- departments of social service
- child welfare settings
- the Veterans Administration
- non-profits
- court systems
- employee assistance programs
- school settings



Macro Concentration

The Macro concentration prepares graduates for careers that improve organizations, communities, and society through positive social change. Macro social work practice includes community organizing and development, social planning, policy analysis and development, political and social action, advocacy and government and nonprofit agency administration and resource development.

Macro coursework

Macro coursework generally focuses in one of three practice areas, 1) Community Action, 2) Organizational Leadership and 3) Policy Advocacy. The Macro curriculum, therefore, includes a required choice of three courses that reflect those practice areas: Program Development (SWOA 703), Community Organization (SWOA 704) and Social Policy and Social Change (SWOA 707). Program Development is designed to expand students' knowledge of and skills in the design, development and management of programs in human service organizations within a multicultural environment. Community Organization aims to expand and refine student's skills in organization-building and collective action. Social Policy and Social Change introduces both the analytic and interactional skills associated with social policy development, including social problem analysis, social planning, the legislative process at the federal, state, and local levels, policy analysis and evaluation, and policy advocacy and social change.
